Contractors not paying workers required wages, investigation finds

Investigations by the city of Ann Arbor show city-hired construction contractors are not paying their workers as much as they should be in some cases.

Through compliance checks on job sites to enforce the city's prevailing wage requirements, Ann Arbor found 24 contractor violations during the 2022 construction season.

That was disclosed in a report from City Administrator Milton Dohoney discussed at a City Council meeting earlier this month.

Council member Jen Eyer, D-4th Ward, questioned whether the city should continue doing business with contractors failing to meet the wage requirements.

'The city of Ann Arbor requires all contractors that we hire for public improvements projects to pay the local prevailing wage, which is essentially the local union wages for skilled and craft labor," she said.

The council asked city staff in 2016 to start doing more to make sure contractors were following the law, including reviewing certified payroll records. The city also has conducted spot checks on job sites, interviewing contractor's employees about their hourly pay rates and what type of work they perform.

When those spot checks reportedly found only one violation in five years, there was some consideration of stopping them last year, but the City Council voted 7-3 to keep going.

"City Council wants to expand compliance evaluations to include periodic, onsite checks that a contractor's employees are performing jobs and duties which are consistent with payroll records provided to the city," the council said in a resolution.

Dohoney said the council's vote last July led city staff to expand how it was checking for compliance, including more wage interviews, and that yielded the 24 violations.

Overall, the city reviewed payroll information for 25 contracts with 54 contractors, Dohoney said.

By the end of January, 17 violations were resolved and seven still were being addressed.

"The 7 violations left to address include: 3 delinquent certified payrolls (payrolls not yet received for work completed), 3 unresolved instances of underpaid employees and one wage rate interview conducted for an employee missing from the submitted certified payroll," Dohoney's

Throughout the 2022 construction season, violations were addressed as soon as possible, Dohoney said.

"Of the contractors that had violations relating to pay, most were subcontractors unaware of the correct wage determination associated with the project," he wrote. "They quickly resolved the issue once provided the correct wage determination."

Others were minor oversights and were resolved quickly, he said, indicating city staff was working with the contractors to resolve the remaining seven violations.

Eyer said she still wants to know more, including which contractors were in violation and the consequences. She has asked the city administrator for more information.

"I'm particularly concerned about the ones who have unresolved violations at this point," she said, adding it's concerning so many contractors apparently didn't know the correct wage rates.

"I'd also further like to investigate what other municipalities do when contractors fail to comply, fail to remedy such issues or are repeat offenders," she said. "Do we levy fines? Do we consider disbarment from future bidding?"

Eyer pointed out the city code allows the city to remove contractors from the city's bidders list for up to two years for failure to comply.

City staff has yet to provide a list of violators and any penalties imposed, nor more specific details about the

City makes property tax relief available to more low-income homeowners

More low-income Ypsilanti homeowners will be able to reduce their property tax bills in 2023, thanks to changes in local guidelines that bring the city more in line with its

Local Michigan jurisdictions annually set criteria for residents to apply for a poverty exemption, also called a hardship exemption, by demonstrating low levels of income and assets in an application for the reduction or elimination of property taxes, which can amount to thousands of dollars each year.

Last year in Ypsilanti a household of one person could make a maximum of \$12,880 annually to qualify — the federal poverty level and the absolute lowest income cap allowed by Michigan law. That threshold also was nearly half the level in neighboring jurisdictions, such as Ypsilanti Township, meaning fewer city residents qualified for the tax relief.

But that's changing this year.

On Feb. 7, Ypsilanti leaders nearly doubled the income limit for 2023, setting it at \$24,750 for a single-person household, while also raising it for larger households.

Officials also axed a requirement that eligible homeowners prove their liquid assets, such as money in bank accounts, fall under 150% of their projected tax bill. Neighboring townships didn't have that test in place, and it only added more complication and confusion, Council member Evan Sweet said as he proposed the change.

'The intent was to have more eligible households, so that we can be more comparable with the region as a whole, so that people that are living in the city limits are not at a disadvantage compared to other folks in other eastern Washtenaw County communities," Sweet said.

As in other communities, applicants for poverty exemptions in Ypsilanti have to meet income requirements and also have the value of their assets — including investments, second homes and valuables — fall under a certain threshold to qualify.

That asset guideline for small households in Ypsilanti, set at the federal poverty level, also was significantly more restrictive than the city's neighbors, said Council member Steve Wilcoxen.

He moved to change the asset limit to \$20,000 for households of one and two people, using federal poverty levels, which exceed that sum, for bigger households.

A homeowner's primary residence doesn't count toward the asset limit, and Sweet also proposed to exempt their standard mode of transportation, whether a car or vehicle such as an e-bike.

The changes proposed by Sweet and Wilcoxen passed unanimously.

Under the 2023 guidelines passed Feb. 7, homeowners who meet the criteria and apply can receive a 50% reduction in their property tax bills.

That still leaves low-income households with a tax burden, Yvonne Cudney, community education and outreach coordinator with the Housing Bureau for Seniors, told elected officials before they discussed the poverty exemption rules.

"This will penalize the homeowners with the lowest of the low incomes. My question to City Council is, is this what Council intended to do?" she asked.

City leaders maintained the 50% reduction level, though some council members said they would have preferred another option.

Ypsilanti has seen about seven to 10 poverty exemption applications each year under its previous, more restrictive, guidelines, Shaw told officials. The majority of those were granted. Some older adults on fixed incomes apply on an annual basis, while others whose economic situation changes may only apply when they qualify, he said.

The applications are concentrated in the south side of Ypsilanti, city Assessor Courtney Borden told city leaders.

Information, guidelines and applications for poverty tax exemptions for every municipality in Washtenaw County are available at washtenaw.org/2339/Poverty-Exemptions. Applications are considered annually by local boards of review, and Ypsilanti's board holds three regular meetings a year, beginning in March. Borden, the city assessor, can help residents with the

application process, and the Housing Bureau, serving people 55 and older also provides free assistance, according to

Parole absconder sentenced to prison

Having fled parole in California for Michigan, a sex offender is heading to a Michigan prison after getting in a meth-related shootout with police along a Bay County road. Though no one was wounded, it was a confrontation the absconder was lucky to walk away from, according to his sentencing judge.

One of the officers he shot at, meanwhile, expressed forgiveness for his assail-

"He's a danger to society and he shouldn't be free, and that's human justice," Hampton Township Public Safety Lt. Michael Wedding said. "I look more at the soul of people, and that's why I forgave him. I gave him my Bible ... because he lost his freedom but I want him to have the freedom he can find eternally. Free of sin and guilt and shame, because we've all

Manuel D. Thiel, 35, appeared Jan. 30 before Bay County Circuit Judge Joseph K. Sheeran for sentencing. In November, Thiel pleaded no contest to four counts of felony firearm, two counts of assault with a dangerous weapon, and single counts of carrying a weapon with unlawful intent and possession of methamphetamine. Thiel also pleaded as a fourth-time habitual offender.

Sheeran sentenced him to four concurrent counts of 64 months to 15 years in prison and four flat two-year terms. The two-year stints are consecutive to the longer terms. The judge gave Thiel credit for 477 days served in the jail, which only applies to the two-year terms.

Thiel declined to speak when Sheeran gave him the opportunity.

This, of course, was such a highly dangerous and reckless action you took,' Sheeran told Thiel. "It's very lucky no one was killed or injured. You're lucky you weren't killed. The Hampton Township officers showed tremendous restraint in responding to your use of lethal force against them. You're really lucky to be alive."

'I HOPE YOU APPRECIATE IT'

Lt. Wedding sat in the back of courtroom for the hearing. At a previously scheduled date, he delivered a victim's impact statement and spoke with Thiel.

"I was able to tell him I completely forgive him, how God was my peace, strength and courage the day of the shooting and has been my whole career," Wedding said.

The lieutenant shared Bible verses with Thiel and encouraged him to find solace

Wedding also asked others to pray for Thiel.

Sheeran described Wedding's statement as among the most moving and compelling he's heard during his time on the

"I hope you appreciate it," he told Thiel. "I think you do. I just hope you're able to turn things around here. You've got a substantial sentence, but the rest of your life is really up to you."

By pleading no contest rather than guilty, Thiel did not admit to having committed any crimes. Defense attorney Andrea J. LaBean said Thiel pleaded as such due to lacking memory of his offenses.

THE INCIDENT

Sheeran relied on police reports to enter convictions on the record. Those reports say an Essexville man on the afternoon of Oct. 10, 2021, called 911 to report a man having pointed a shotgun at him from the passenger-side window of a silver Jeep. A be-on-the-lookout advisory was issued to area law enforcement.

A short time later, Hampton Township Public Safety Officer Shawn Bacon and Lt. Wedding spotted the Jeep heading east on Arms Road near Finn Road. As officers exited their vehicle and approached, Thiel lifted a shotgun from the passenger compartment and fired one round at them.

Both officers returned fire and took cover. A moment later, the vehicle's female driver exited through the driver's side door and lay down on the ground. Thiel then exited the vehicle and hid behind it, while the two officers stayed behind their vehicle and yelled commands toward Thiel.

As more officers arrived, Thiel remained noncompliant for about 40 minutes.

Just after 3 p.m., Bay County Sheriff's deputies launched a drone in hopes of getting an aerial view of the suspect, at which point Thiel surrendered. No one was wounded in the exchange of gunfire.

'Officers were made aware that Thiel had used methamphetamines earlier in the day and his behavior reflected as such," police wrote in an affidavit.

The woman with Thiel said she had met him about a week and a half prior. She said he displayed paranoid behavior and was on a tether out of California. During a recent trip to the Upper Peninsula, Thiel cut off the tether, the woman said.

Thiel had also shown the woman some crystal meth he had acquired in California, as well as a shotgun and three shells.

"Thiel stated to her that he was going to 'take two out," the affidavit states. "She advised (a detective sergeant) she interpreted this as Thiel was going to shoot two police officers."

\$5.8M OK'd for SVSU housing updates

Nearly \$5.8 million has been earmarked by the Saginaw Valley State University Board of Control to build upon the school's already impressive on-campus housing.

In a release by the University, the funds to begin renovations were approved at the board's Dec. 16 meeting.

Renovation plans will focus on improvements to the university's Pine Grove Central apartment buildings and the Tranquil Hall portion of its first-year suites, at a cost of \$3.8 million and \$2 million, respectivelv.

The improvements come after another year of SVSU receiving the top "Best Dorms" ranking among all U.S. public universities, the fourth year in a row from college review site Niche.

According to university officials, the buildings included in renovation plans are among SVSU's oldest housing units -Tranquil Hall, originally constructed in 1971, and Pine Grove apartments, built in

Work on both projects is expected to begin in May, shortly after the end of the regular winter semester.

Other renovation funds approved by the board of control include \$400,000 to update flooring in the Ryder Athletic Center and \$28.8 million for Brown Hall renovations, \$21.8 million from the state of Michigan, \$7 million matched by SVSU. after damages originally stemming from 2019 fire suppression efforts expedited

The release said preliminary work on Brown Hall has begun and construction will begin in May 2024.

These housing renovations align with projects listed during a previous board meeting.

Over a time span of 2024-2028, \$5 million has been proposed for energy conservation initiatives, \$8 million for technology updates and \$35 million for upcoming or deferred campus infrastructure maintenance.

New Zealand fears more fatalities after cyclone kills 4

WELLINGTON, NEW ZEALAND » A cyclone that left a devastating wake of extensive flooding and landslides in New Zealand has claimed at least four lives and police have "grave concerns" for other residents who remain unaccounted for, the prime minister said on Wednesday.

Cyclone Gabrielle struck the country's north on Monday and has brought more destruction to this nation of 5 million than any weather event in decades.

Police said at least four people had been confirmed killed by the storm, including a child caught in rising water on Tuesday at Eskdale on Hawke's Bay. All four fatalities occurred near the same North Island east coast bay, two in landslides and two by drowning.

A weather station in the Hawke's Bay region recorded three times more rain over Monday night than usually falls for the entire month of February, authorities said.

Hipkins said it was unclear how many people remained unaccounted for, with several communities still isolated by floodwaters, landslides and telecommunications outages.

Police said 1,442 people had been reported uncontactable in the North Island as of Wednesday afternoon.

"We expect the vast majority of these people will be accounted for. However, missing for whom police do hold grave concerns," Hipkins told reporters.

DETROIT » Stellantis is telling the owners of nearly 341,000 Ram diesel trucks to park them outdoors because an electrical connector can overheat and cause

The company said Wednesday it's recalling the trucks to replace the connectors after getting reports of six potentially related fires. In one case, the owner reported that a fire started after the truck's engine was shut off.

The recall covers cer-

tain Ram 2500 and 3500 pickups and Ram 3500, 4500 and 5500 chassis cab trucks from the 2021 through 2023 model years. All have 6.7-liter Cummins diesel engines with older heater-grid connectors.

Stellantis, formerly Fiat Chrysler, says it will begin notifying owners by letter next month. But starting Thursday, owners can go to https://www.mopar. com/en-us/my-vehicle/recalls/search.html and key in their vehicle identification numbers to see if their trucks are part of the recall.



Washington — Maybe they came from China. Maybe from somewhere farther away. A lot farther away.

The downing of four aerial devices by U.S. warplanes has touched off rampant misinformation about the objects, their origin and their purpose, showing how complicated world events and a lack of information can quickly create the perfect conditions for unchecked conjecture and misinformation.

The presence of mysterious objects high in the sky doesn't

NATION Haley announces run for president

Charleston, S.C. – Nikki Haley, the former South Carolina governor and United Nations ambassador, announced her candidacy for president on Tuesday, becoming the first major challenger to former President Donald Trump for the 2024 Republican nomination.

The announcement, delivered in a tweeted video, marks an about-face for the ex-Trump Cabinet official, who said two years ago that she wouldn't challenge her former boss for the White House in 2024. But she changed her mind in recent months, citing, among other things, the country's economic troubles and the need for "generational change," a nod to the 76-year-old Trump's age.

Haley, 51, is the first in a long line of Republicans who are expected to launch 2024 campaigns in the coming months. Among them are Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis, former Vice President Mike Pence, former Secretary of State Mike Pompeo and Sen. Tim Scott of South Carolina.

Students and community share how they are processing attack

EAST LANSING – The morning after a lone gunman killed three people and left five others in critical condition at a Lansing hospital, people who were on campus shared their experiences as the gunfire erupted and police descended on the university.

About 8:18 p.m. Monday, a single man entered Berkey Hall near Grand River Avenue and shot several people, killing two. Police say 43-year-old Anthony McRae then went to the student Union and killed another person and wounded others before fleeing campus. He was later found dead of a self-inflicted gunshot

Police on Tuesday identified the three victims of Monday night's mass shooting at Michigan State University's campus as students Brian Fraser of Grosse Pointe, Alexandria Verner of Clawson and Arielle Anderson of Harper Woods.

In the aftermath of the shooting, people who were on campus, and others, reacted to the carnage.

'A complete loss of security'

Cooper Burton, a senior, was practicing with his acapella group in IM Circle, about a quarter mile southwest of the MSU Union. He was moved into the building's basement locker rooms about 8:50 p.m.

Burton said while barricaded, two students near him were talking about how this lockdown was different than the last school shooting they had lived through.

"It just felt very dystopian," he said.

Police cleared IM Circle after about four hours and let students leave on their own afterward. Burton said his feelings of safety on campus will likely never be

"I haven't gotten out of bed this morning and I don't really want to go outside," he said. "I just feel kind of like a little kid again. I feel like the places that were safe for me before are not at all any more, and I feel like the things that I took for granted are just completely gone now."

'We were just spectators'

Eleanor Hoss, a senior nursing student, was at The Graduate's rooftop bar for a friend's birthday celebration when she saw droves of emergency vehicles approach the MSU Union about 8:25 p.m.

"We saw two cop cars come, and then we saw three, and then we saw four. And then we saw a fire truck pull around the other way, and we saw more come from the Okemos side and they just swarmed the Union."

Hoss saw students running out of exits with their hands up at about 8:30, which continued for 10 to 15 minutes.

"We were just spectators," she said. "Every time I looked down it just looked like more (responders) had arrived. It didn't look like anything was dissipat-

Hoss said the bar and hotel locked down around 8:50 - hotel guests were allowed to move through the hotel, but bar patrons had to stay. She remained until around midnight and was offered a room voucher to remain in the hotel overnight. The shelter in place order was lifted soon after and Hoss returned to her car.

nights for MSU journalism senior Veronica Bolanos and her roommates, but this week a night of fun quickly turned into a night of fear.

The dishes went untouched like an apocalyptic scene as everyone messaged group chats during the shooting, trying to find out who was on campus. They ultimately barricaded the doors of their home just north of Grand River Avenue, not far from where the shooting took place.

"It felt like the most vulnerable I had ever been, or like the most helpless I could have ever been," Bolanos said.

Her friend, Jane Nodland, was at the Union during the shooting and ran with her boyfriend to the Graduate East Lansing hotel for safety. Bolanos' little brother, Michael, was in the MSU Auditorium and she picked him up at a nearby dorm.

"Yesterday showed that it could still happen anywhere, any time, any place,"

She said people should be thinking about their graduation pictures or spring break plans. But after Monday, "it's just all tainted now."

MSU 'felt so far' away with daughter on campus

Geri Zeldes, a tenured journalism professor and West Bloomfield resident, was worried for her daughter Jordyn, who is a

"It felt so far," Zeldes said. "I wanted to hop in my car and pick Jordyn up. But I also wanted to be respectful toward the law enforcement agents who were asking parents not to go on campus and especially during the active shooter por-

Jordyn Zeldes was sheltering alone in her sorority room Monday night, worried that moving to join others in another part of the house would make noise and cause

Geri Zeldes said she was in "anxiety mode," huddled with her husband and three sons that night, between hearing from family members and students, trying to FaceTime Jordyn and listening to the police scanner.

"Î was crying at some points, because I was hearing back from students. It was tears of joy," Zeldes said. "And then I was angry. I got angry at policies or culture."

1 dead, another critically injured following shooting

One person is dead and another in critical condition following a Saturday shooting in Flint.

Flint police were called to Midway Square Townhomes about 3:20 a.m., where a 34-year-old Flint woman had been shot in a vehicle outside an apartment on Devon Lane.

She was taken to a local hospital where she later died from her injuries. Her name has not been released.

Police were also called about 5:40 a.m. to Lippincott Street, near Seymour Avenue, for a crash.

Officers said they found a 33-year-old Flint man slumped over the steering wheel, suffering from multiple gunshot wounds. He was taken to Hurley Medical Center where he was listed in critical condition.

Police said both victims were shot in the vehicle while it was parked outside the townhomes. The woman apparently exited the vehicle after being shot and was taken inside a residence before being taken to the hospital. The man apparently continued to drive the vehicle before crashing.

The homicide is Flint's third of 2023, according to the most recent data provided by the city's police department Feb. 5.

The case is being investigated by the Flint Major Case Unit, which is comprised of investigators with the Flint Police Department and Michigan State Police.

5 transitional houses to help returning citizens

A Flint organization fighting recidivism has received a \$283,375 grant from Islamic Relief USA to continue operations in Genesee County.

The MADE Institute, an organization that offers returning citizens and at-risk youth employment, education and housing opportunities, recently announced the grant.

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





Mondays and Wednesdays at the Union, eating in the cafeteria after triathlon practice with his friends. After hearing what he and other students described as "three pops" of gunfire, he said he hid behind columns before racing out of the building and into the dorm room of a stranger, where they sheltered for hours.

"I've live around here for 21 years, my whole life. My house is a block and a half from campus," Jimenez said, pausing outside the Union building as friends came up and embraced him tightly in Wednesday's piercing wind. "My family works here; my brother works here. Having to think about those things every day now - my friends and family and their safety and even my own safety because everyone lives far away and I have to stay here and see this every day now."

One of those friends was Connor Dunn, who also trains for triathlons. Dunn said it was difficult to go back to the building, and it may get worse when school reopens next week when thousands of students will have to walk back through school doors.

On Wednesday, Union traffic was light, just those wanting to claim belongings left behind.

"It's going to be hard for a lot of people," Dunn said, "especially those in a worse position than me. Some did see the shooter. I was lucky enough where I didn't see that visual. But I know a lot of people don't feel safe anymore."

Jimenez said he encourages other students to focus on their mental health. He's visited school counselors and is worried how the shooting will affect his anxiety and depression.

"I'm trying to motivate myself to do things and not just sit inside," he said. "If you don't do things or talk to someone, it could get worse. Even if you don't feel

comfortable, it could help."

Asked about what he feels students need right now, he said outreach and support from the university is important.

"I feel like they should check up on every student, an email or something. A lot of students don't talk about their mental health," Jimenez said. "I do, and it's difficult. We're a big community and we should care about each other, regardless of our ethnicity, age, race or what not."



Junior leading it plans to teach beyond the alphabet, host speakers

At Chippewa Valley High School the world language class selections include Spanish, French and German, but a new club is now expanding language offerings in a whole different Language.

The club was the brainchild of junior Ashlea Kittle, a 16-year old student with one deaf parent and another hard of hearing. She has been speaking American Sign Language all her life.

"I feel like the more people that know sign lan-guage the better," Kittle

Kittle moved from North Carolina to Michigan about a year ago, but just set the wheels in motion to begin the American Sign Language club a few weeks ago. Her goal is to spread her knowledge of American Sign Language, as well as the Deaf culture and community, among her classmates.

"I mentioned it to my science teacher in casual conversation and she was like, 'Start it. Look into it," Kittle said.

She began by emailing a clubs director and stopping by the counseling office.

"I figured it would not hurt to ask. I was directed to the principal and then to the club advisor," Kittle said. "I sent an email asking how difficult it would be to start and have a club. She said it was not difficult. I had to fill out the paperwork and find an advisor, a teacher to agree."

Kittle asked teacher Melanie Slank to serve as the advisor, and she agreed.

"Ashlea is very passionate about Deaf culture and sign language, and I wanted to support her in starting the club," Slank said. "I am also interested in learning about Deaf culture and sign language."

The club is open to any Chippewa Valley High School student. Slank said students can join the club using Remind, and there are no costs to join. In forming the club, Kittle also needed to develop ideas for how she would conduct the club and attract interest.

"It is going to be, it is a club, but more of a class sort of thing. Like with any new language, you have to apply yourself and practice, learn and memorize," Kittle said.

The Chippewa Valley High School American Sign Language club was scheduled to hold its first meeting at the Clinton Township school on Feb. 16 for an hour after school. Kittle plans to have the club

New Zealand fears more fatalities after cyclone kills 4

By The Associated Press

WELLINGTON, NEW ZEALAND » A cyclone that left a devastating wake of extensive flooding and landslides in New Zealand has claimed at least four lives and police have "grave concerns" for other residents who remain unaccounted for, the prime minister said on Wednesday.

Cyclone Gabrielle struck the country's north on Monday and has brought more destruction to this nation of 5 million than any weather event in decades.

Police said at least four people had been confirmed killed by the storm, including a child caught in rising water on Tuesday at Eskdale on Hawke's Bay. All four fatalities occurred near the same North Island east coast bay, two in landslides and two by drowning.

A weather station in the Hawke's Bay region recorded three times more rain over Monday night than usually falls for the entire month of February, authorities said.

Hipkins said it was unclear how many people remained unaccounted for, with several communities still isolated by floodwaters, landslides and telecommunications outages.

Police said 1,442 people had been reported uncontactable in the North Island as of Wednesday afternoon.

"We expect the vast majority of these people will be accounted for. However, there are several people pleted by late Wednesday. missing for whom police do hold grave concerns," Hipkins told reporters.

Hipkins said he could not in danger. put a figure on how many

More than 300 people were rescued Tuesday from the Hawke's Bay area, including 60 stranded on a single roof, an official said. The final 25 rescues of individuals and family groups were expected to be completed on Wednesday.

DETROIT » Stellantis is telling the owners of nearly 341,000 Ram diesel trucks to park them outdoors because an electrical connector can overheat and cause

The company said Wednesday it's recalling the trucks to replace the connectors after getting reports of six potentially related fires. In one case, the owner reported that a fire started after the truck's engine was shut off.

The recall covers cer-

tain Ram 2500 and 3500 pickups and Ram 3500, 4500 and 5500 chassis cab trucks from the 2021 through 2023 model years. All have 6.7-liter Cummins diesel engines with older heater-grid connectors.

Stellantis, formerly Fiat Chrysler, says it will begin notifying owners by letter next month. But starting Thursday, owners can go to https://www.mopar. com/en-us/my-vehicle/recalls/search.html and key in their vehicle identification numbers to see if their trucks are part of the recall.

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



Williams named creative director of Louis **Vuitton menswear**

Pharrell Williams has been named creative director of Louis Vuitton menswear, according to the fashion house.

Louis Vuitton announced Williams's new role in a news release Tuesday, calling the producer and mogul "a visionary" and a "global icon" who has poured his creative spark into many facets for more than two decades.

Williams will be taking the position that once belonged to designer Virgil Abloh, who died Nov. 28, 2021. Wil-

liams' first collection under Louis Vuitton will be revealed in June during men's fashion week in Paris.

The Billionaire Boys Club designer has worked with Louis Vuitton on collaborations in 2004 and 2008 with his 1.1 millionaire sunglasses, which Abloh pulled from the archives during his first collection for Louis

Despite being known for producing megahits such as "Happy," "Frontin' " and "Blurred Lines," Williams has a rich history with fashion collaborations, having worked with Moncler, Adidas and Chanel.

Production to resume on movie 'Rust' after fatal shooting

Production is expected to resume this spring on the movie "Rust" that was halted in October 2021 after a fatal shooting on the set involving actor-producer Alec Baldwin.

Rust Movie Productions also announced Tuesday that a related documentary will detail the completion of the film and the life of cinematographer Halyna Hutchins, who died shortly after being wounded during rehearsals at a ranch on the outskirts of Santa Fe.

Baldwin and Hannah Gutierrez-Reed, the weapons supervisor on the set of the Western, were charged last month with felony involuntary manslaughter in Hutchins' shooting death.


ins' widower, Matthew Hutchins, will serve as the film's new executive producer with Blanca Cline as the new cinematographer.

King Charles III expresses sorrow for those affected by quake

Britain's King Charles III met with Turkish and Syrian communities in London on Tuesday, showing support to those sending aid to their homeland and

expressing sorrow for those affected by last week's devastating earthquake.

UK to organize vigils and pay their respects to lost relatives. The monarch heard from those grieving for their

families back home, including Salah Al-Asmar, who told the king he lost his parents, brother and other relatives to the earthquake in Antakya, Turkey.

"For seven days, my family were under the rubble. There was no rescue team. No one could support them in this moment. I haven't been able to sleep for days," Al-Asmar said after meeting with Charles.

Earlier Tuesday, Charles and Umit Yalcin, Turkey's ambassador to Britain, visited a west London charity organizing shipments of tents, blankets, winter clothes and toiletries to help those left homeless by the quake in Turkey.

Charles and his wife, Camilla, the queen consort, have donated to an emergency earthquake appeal jointly organized by British aid groups that has raised more than 74 million pounds (\$90 million) in the past few days.

SC4 applied for the funding allocated to labor, health and human services, education and other related agencies in winter last year.

Peters said in a press release that he was proud to have helped secure the funding for the Challenger Center to encourage STEM learning.

"After visiting the center and seeing the exhibits firsthand, I know this is a meaningful investment in St. Clair County and will provide invaluable learning experiences for its visitors," he said.

The funding will be used to add and enhance the exhibits and activities within the Experience Center and Challenger Learning Center. Kristen Copenhaver, SC4's chief marketing officer, said the college is currently exploring its options.

Copenhaver said the college wants to encourage

people of all ages to explore the Experience Center and Challenger Learning Center.

The Experience Center is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Self-directed opportunities include exploration of the Dr. Bassam H. Nasr Natural Science Museum, a bird and mineral gallery and ambient learning exhibits.

The Challenger Learning Center allows group of 18 to 34 people to take space-themed simulated missions. Additionally, there will be an open mission Saturday that will allow smaller groups to participate.

'We look forward to adding to our permanent collection and expanding STEM-based learning activities that educate and inspire," Copenhaver said.

Since its opening in April 2022, the Challenger Learning Center has seen more than 2,500 visitors. It is one of 40 Challenger Learning Centers nationwide and the only one in Michigan.

building another 18,200 square feet for a new coating block.

"Our end customers are Honda, Toyota. The reason we're expanding is actually for Tesla. ... What we're doing is expanding to the north on 2015 Dove St," he

Michigan Metal Coatings purchased the neighboring property from the city in 2019 for \$70,000. Its other Dove properties were purchased in 2018.

"Port Huron's been a great place for us to do business, and we had the chance to purchase through the city the three and a half acres north of us on 20th Street," Dusenberry said. "So, now we're expanding into that property. We're planning to grow here in Port

According to the company's application, work for the new addition is required to be completed within two years, putting Michigan Metal Coating's deadline at the end of 2024.

Bruce Seymore, vice president for business services at the Economic Development Alliance of St. Clair County, said in addition to the \$2.6 million expansion itself, plans include the installation of \$2 million worth of equipment.

When asked about determining the seven-year abatement period — up to 12 is allowed under state law - by Councilwoman Anita Ashford, Seymore said they worked with city administration to set details.

'The company is committing to create seven jobs through this expansion project, which they will report back to the city clerk on an annual basis through the life of the abatement," he said.

Indifference caused inmate's death, suit claims

SAGINAW — Four days before his son's birth, Bay City resident Joshua Aldrich died on the floor of a Saginaw County Jail cell of a methamphetamine overdose.

Now, a federal lawsuit is alleging jail staff were deliberately indifferent and stood by watching as Aldrich suffered an agonizing death.

"The Saginaw County police and jail staff took an oath to protect all citizens no matter race, sexual orientation, disability, etc., including whether a person was a drug addict or a convicted criminal," said Aldrich's mother, Janet Bates. "I just want the truth to be told about what happened to my son. His life could have been saved."

Attorneys with the Farmington Hillsbased Charara Lovell & Associates filed a federal wrongful death lawsuit on Bates' behalf Friday against Saginaw County and six employees - Sgt. Herbert Van-Riper, corrections officers Travis Woodward, Jared Wright and Michael King, and nurses Sheila L. Kokko and Penny J. Church.

The suit alleges the defendants violated Aldrich's Eighth and 14th Amendment rights. The Eighth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution forbids cruel and unusual punishment, and the 14th requires due process and equal protection for all.

"Defendants owed Joshua Aldrich a duty to protect him from the clear and present danger of an overdose, which (they) deliberately ignored," the suit states.

A TIMELINE OF DISTRESS

Police arrested the 26-year-old Aldrich the night of Dec. 13, 2021, on a probation violation. Aldrich swallowed a baggie containing drugs prior to or during the arrest, leading police to take him to a hospital for

The hospital discharged Aldrich at 6:30 a.m. Dec. 14, after which police took him to the jail. He was booked at 7:55 a.m.

"Mr. Aldrich spent the next several hours in his intake cell pushing the buzzer, banging on the door, and begging to speak with his mother," the lawsuit states. At this time, cameras captured Aldrich retrieving something from his pants and hiding it under his cell's sink.

Aldrich later retrieved the hidden item and was transferred to a padded cell by VanRiper, King, Wright and Woodard at

During this time, Woodward heard Aldrich state he was hearing voices and VanRiper heard Aldrich seemingly speaking to non-existent people, the suit contin-

"VanRiper stated that he believed Mr. Aldrich was going through detox safety," the suit states.

About 8:52 p.m., cameras recorded Aldrich remove something from his pocket and swallow it. Autopsy reports would later confirm he had ingested methamphetamines.

At this point, Aldrich's behavior grew increasingly erratic and alarming, the suit continues. Within 10 minutes of swallowing the meth, he began sweating, yelling and trying to hide in his cell.

From about 9:17 p.m. to 9:31 p.m., Aldrich repeatedly pressed a call button, banged on his door and appeared to be talking to himself. For the next 20 minutes, he kept pressing the button as he screamed and jumped around his cell.

Starting around 10 p.m., Aldrich twice asked for water as he banged on his door and began pacing his cell.

"Defendants saw this behavior through the observation window three separate times between approximately 10:31 p.m. and 10:43 p.m.," the suit states. "Mr. Aldrich was clearly in distress but Defendants did nothing."

Aldrich then began punching the window and food slot and started breathing heavily. He took off his shirt, then bent over and finally sat on the floor. At 11:30 p.m., he stood up and resumed talking to

himself, shortly thereafter trying to open his cell door and punching the floor.

At 11:41 p.m., after nearly an hour of not being checked on, one of the nurses visited Aldrich and asked him if he was OK. Aldrich ran to the door and began pounding his fist on the window, at which point the nurse left without giving him aid, the suit alleges. About midnight Dec. 15, Aldrich fell to

the floor and talked to himself as his heavy breathing continued. He lied motionless until 12:31 a.m., when one of the staffers checked on him. Five minutes later, Woodward opened the window and banged on the food slot while yelling Aldrich's name, but Aldrich did not respond.

'Woodward claims to have then asked Defendant Church [if] Mr. Aldrich should be checked on and Church responded that they should not," the suit states. "At this point, Mr. Aldrich has been unresponsive on the floor of his cell for almost 30 minutes and still none of the Defendants offer any aid or assistance."

At 1:03 a.m., Wright began yelling Aldrich's name through the window and causing noise to get his attention. Still, Aldrich did not move.

Wright told Woodward he did not think Aldrich was breathing and urged him to contact VanRiper, the shift commander. At 1:07 a.m., Woodward entered the cell and slapped Aldrich's leg, getting no response.

Woodward and VanRiper then tried rolling Aldrich over but it appeared rigor mortis had set in, with his face blue and mouth foaming. Kokko then allegedly entered the cell and tried giving Aldrich Narcan, an opioid antagonist.

With Aldrich still unresponsive, jail personnel applied a defibrillator to him and and decided to move (him) for (his) own attempted CPR until paramedics arrived


> Paramedics pronounced Aldrich dead at 1:46 a.m. Autopsy results indicated Aldrich's cause of death was acute intoxication from amphetamine and methamphetamine, with the manner being listed as accidental.

A 'HEINOUS' DEATH

Attorney Stephen M. Lovell, who authored the lawsuit, described the circumstances of Aldrich's death as "heinous," adding to the fact he never got to see his son born four days later.

"Certainly, he could have been saved, 100%," Lovell said. "They had every opportunity in the world to save him. I just can't figure out why they didn't go in there. He was not a risk to others or anything when he was lying in the middle of the floor of his cell not responding. All anybody had to do was go in there and check on him. By the time they did, he's blue in the face and cold to the touch. It was just way too late at that point."

The suit is not seeking a dollar amount in damages, with Lovell saying that figure will be up to a jury to decide. He referenced another wrongful death of a Michigan jail inmate his firm handled that was settled for \$2.7 million.
